





Why a T-6? by Laura Stants, WASP Squadron member, Kokomo, Indiana

On a sunny, warm September Saturday afternoon in 2006, I strapped into a T-6 for the first time. We were at small grass strip where we host an annual fly-in charity event, and Tom Woods was generous enough to loan us his T-6 to sell rides at our event. The last flight of the day, I climbed in the back seat, and the pilot gave me the controls. The open cockpit, the roar of the 1340 radial engine, the smell of the oil and exhaust and grass, the heavy plane with the light controls, it grabbed me by the throat and has never let go.

Two years and two weeks later, I soloed Nathan Davis's T-6. Friends and family sat near the runway on a golf cart, and as the sun went down I came around and did three full stop 3point takeoffs and landings, with the canopy open and the wind in my hair, polishing off a full day of learning. My instructor gave me a dzus tool with the date of my first solo written on it, and advice that two other very experienced T-6 pilots also separately passed on, advice I heeded then and always will. "About the time you start feeling comfortable in the airplane...don't." The T-6 is an honest airplane, not particularly difficult, but one that demands your respect both on the ground and at the edge of the envelope in the air. It is called "The

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Pilot Maker" and, as a training platform, it is hard to imagine anything better.

Flying the T-6 has had an impact on my life. The people I have met, the stories I have heard from the Greatest Generation, the men and women who were the real pilots of these airplanes, who did their duty to their country many times without recognition or fanfare. I am a custodian of the plane and the history, and nothing pleases me more than to share that story where I can. It is why I am so eager for the CAF WASP T-6 to start its journey. I know the impact a living, breathing airplane will have, not just sitting quietly in a museum, but roaring overhead with supersonic prop tips blatting at the people below. It reminds and honors those who were there, it educates those who did not know and it inspires those few who feel it in their bones that they too need to be a part of this.

Sharing this with my daughter since she was six has been an integral part of the experience. She has grown up around it, but still understands the importance of the history in which she participates. She has been on formation flyovers, flown into airshows and flyins, and sat under the wings of both a P-51 and the T-6 for hours, as a small child, listening to stories and polishing off bugs. I pulled her from school to attend the last "Gathering of Mustangs and Legends", telling the school she would learn more history there than sitting in the classroom. She met and hung out with three WWII fighter pilots who flew the actual plane ours (Nathan Davis's "Checkertail Clan") was restored to represent, connecting with a



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generation of people that we are rapidly losing. It is important to me that my daughter understand this history. This mindset. That she realize what sacrifices were made by the men and women of that time, what courage and duty look like. That you can be young and scared and do what you need to do, because if they can do it, so can you.

On the way home from Oshkosh last year, my daughter was in the back seat of the T-6. We'd barely leveled off when she piped up with "Hey Mom. Do you mind if I fly us home?" I said "Sure thing." Next thing I know, the stick is moving back and forth in my hand, as she firmly says "I have the controls." Yes she does, as I cross my arms, and smile all the way home.

Fixing the problem was a WASP' best option.

METRICS

Our ability to reach and deliver on our mission is dependent on our being able to report our impact/success. Asking for buy-in to our programs or for support, either financial or otherwise, means being able to quantify what we do in a way which is meaningful.

This means counting every time we engage in an activity: Ramp, flyby, touch and go and landing.

At the AirPower History Tour Dallas stop, we will have ramp numbers, "flyby" estimates for the WASP tables, and "touch and goes" where someone takes a card/handout (if we do multiple handout styles we will count each separately). And when someone is engaged in the activity, we will count it as a "landing". While these are just beginning metrics, they are a good start for an important habit to develop.

INQUIRING MINDS...

Want to know the difference between RiseAboveWASP and the WASP Squadron...

RiseAbove is the Educational effort that includes a CAF developed movie, a provenanced airplane, a Flight Plan for Life series of activities and staffing to support the delivery of the program. Its premise is to use the history of a disadvantaged group to tell an inspirational story. RedTail was the first program under the RiseAbove umbrella.

RiseAboveWASP is both a fundraising effort AND the name of an Educational Program. RiseAboveWASP is currently developing the movie and raising funds to complete it. CAF WASP SQUADRON NEWSLETTER Volume 2 Number 4

The WASP Squadron has a mission to deliver outreach* education, based on the WASP story, to the youth of America. The Squadron will deliver the full RiseAboveWASP Program, when it is available.

In the meantime, the Squadron is developing materials and activities, testing them with various organizations and CAF units, packaging them to share with all other CAF units and building metrics to enable continued fund raising in support of further development.

The Squadron is also responsible for developing the Business Plan that will demonstrate its ability to support the operation of the T-6, and upon plane assignment to the Squadron, executing that plan. The Plan is currently scheduled to be presented in mid-June.

***Outreach** means providing services to any populations who otherwise might not have access to those services. A key component of **outreach** is that those providing services are not stationary, but mobile; in other words they are meeting those in need at their locations.
